


# THE HARVEY MILK **STORY**

	What his friends and family didn't know was that Harvey was growing up gay. Harvey knew he was gay by the time he was fourteen, but he would keep that part of himself a closely guarded secret for many years to come. Like so many people of his time, he was afraid of what would happen to him if others knew he was gay. Fears that he would be beaten up at school and abandoned by his friends and family troubled his sleep and tormented his days.
16	Harvey did fall in love and settle down. But the right person was a handsome young man named Joe CampbellHarvey feared he would lose his job, his friends and his family if people found out he was gay.
	Harvey was tired of hiding the fact that he was gay. So when he met and fell in love with Scott Smith, they moved together to a neighborhood in San Fransisco known as the Castro. The Castro was becoming a gay neighborhood, a place where a gay couple could walk down the street, hold hands and show all the signs of affection, joy and pride that people do when they are in love.

	But some people felt threatened by the growing gay movement. They hated and feared the idea of gay people having the same rights as everyone else.
	On a gray November morning, Dan White crawled through a basement window at the back of City Hall with a loaded gun.  Dan White entered the mayor's office and, after a brief argument took place, he shot Mayor George Moscone. Reloading his gun, he hurried down the hall to Harvey Milk's office. Five shots rang out.  Both Mayor Moscone and Harvey Milk were killed.
