

48	GENDER IDENTITYWhen you were born, doctors looked between your legs and assigned your sex. If that is the end of the story for you, great. But if that assignment doesn't fit properly, you are the only one who can figure out what is rightYour gender identity is your personal feeling of your own gender. It does not need to be the same as your assigned sex. It also does not need to be the same as your gender expression- how masculine or feminine you decide to appear or behaveCISGENDER When your gender matches your assigned sex, you are cisgender.
49	NONBINARY Nonbinary means that you do not identify as only male or only femaleThere are several terms you may hear that are associated with being nonbinary, including gender neutral, gender queer, gender fluid, gender diverse, and gender nonconforming. People who identify as nonbinary can use pronouns like they/them, but may choose to use more binary pronouns (she/her and he/him)TRANSGENDER When your gender identity and gender expression are different from your assigned sex, you may be described as transgender, or transOther trans people use hormonal treatments and sometimes surgery to permanently change their body to be more aligned with their gender identity. GENDER DYSPHORIA People who are transgender can feel trapped in the wrong body.

All of the organs in your body have a purpose. Your heart pumps blood, your lungs bring in oxygen so you can breathe, and your intestines absorb nutrients from your food. Your vagina has many After fertilization. the cells of the roles. Mainly it is a **tunnel** that allows things to go in or go out embryo start of your body. The vagina belongs to the reproductive system. to divide. The organs in the reproductive system include the ovaries, uterus, vulva, and vagina. These organs help us have babies (reproduce). Some of the tasks the vagina has are to help sperm get into the uterus, to drain **blood** from the uterus during a period, and to allow the passage of a baby out of your body. The fallopian tube picks up the released egg. Fertilized embryo

### PENIS/VAGINA SEX

During penis/vagina sex, a penis is inserted into the vagina, where it releases a special fluid called semen. This fluid contains millions (yes, millions!) of reproductive cells called sperm. They look like tadpoles and swim up the vagina, through the cervix, into the uterus, up the fallopian tube, and onto an egg.

#### **FERTILIZATION**

Sperm can combine with an egg to create an embryo (a fertilized egg)—this will become a baby! Thousands of sperm attach to the egg's outer shell. As soon as the first sperm gets in, the egg's shell prevents any other sperm from getting inside.
